About Anti-Tourism on Treaty Six Territory

In this exhibition, David LaRiviere proposes an antithetical approach to the consumer-driven acts of tourism, an alternative he describes as "off-centre wanderings that oppose ideal conceptions of place with the realities of actual, lived space. Anti-Tourism seeks to blow up the totalizing narratives of state-sponsored tourism with perspectives that replace the Classical with all manner of minor histories." Here, LaRiviere explores the theme of anti-tourism as it comes to bear on the land where he was born and raised. What is it to be an anti-tourist in your own backyard? The exhibition's centrepiece is a large map of Treaty Six Territory (close to six meters wide) embedded into the gallery wall. Stitched together from hundreds of Google Earth satellite photographs, the map has none of the familiar grids, roads, territorial borders, or settlement names that give people a sense of home and ownership. Various other elements in the exhibition support the Treaty Six map with the artist's meditations on Prince Albert and the erasures perpetrated by its

penitentiaries.

David LaRiviere holds a BFA (University of Alberta, 1989) and an MA Fine Art (Goldsmiths College, University of London, 1996). Since January of 2008, he has been the Artistic Director of PAVED Arts media arts centre in Saskatoon. LaRiviere's work has appeared in numerous exhibitions across Canada, including Truck Gallery, Neutral Ground, and at the Mendel Art Gallery. More recently, he completed a three-month residency, sound walk and solo exhibition project entitled #everysordiddetail at Open Space Arts Society in Victoria, BC, and mounted Treaty Six: The Smooth and the Striated as part of borderLINE: 2020 Biennial of Contemporary Art at the Art Gallery of Alberta.
